## \*\*Welcome and Lighting of the Affirmation Candle

One: We gather in the warmth of so much light today! After weeks of waiting and watching the light be rekindled in our Advent wreath, the circle has come to completion! In this season of Christmas, we celebrate the light of Christ that is born into this world, symbolized by our Christ candle.

And through our Affirmation Candle, we celebrate the light of Christ that is born in us, and we give thanks for all the diversity in which God creates us and calls us good! In this community of faith, we celebrate that:

**Welcome** All are welcome in this place.

All are welcome by God's grace.

#### \*\*Call to Worship

One: In places of war and places of peace...

All: There, we will find the Christ child.

One: In moments of sorrow and moments of joy...

All: There, we will find the Christ child.

One: In times of despair and times of hope...

All: There, we will find the Christ child.

One: In places of hatred and places of love...

All: There, we will find the Christ child.

One: We find the Christ child in *all* places and times, for where two or three are gathered in his name...

All: There, we will find the Christ child!

One: So come, let us gather our hearts to worship, and let us find the Christ child together. Let us pray.

# **Prayer:**

All: God of manger straw and swaddle cloth, God of silent nights and joyfully-chaotic mornings, we long to know you. The hustle and bustle of this time of year can be more than distracting, so for a moment, we pray, still our busy hearts. Quiet our minds. Help us to sink deeply into this day. Help us to pause here, to linger here as we hear your good news spoken over us. (a time of silent prayer)

God, we long to know you, so speak to us now. With grateful hearts, we pray. With grateful hearts, we listen. Amen.

Reading: Luke 2:8-20

Intro: Listen to the Christmas story from the gospel of Luke as though I'm reading it to you for the first time. You may even want to close your eyes

and visualize the scene. Note the variety of ways characters in the story respond to the good news. Put yourself in their shoes. What would your response be? May God bless us with insight as we listen to a reading from our sacred scripture:

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

Reflection: (Penny and Kym)

Reflection Question: Over the course of this Advent, we have explored the ways in which God has dwelled with Creation from generation to generation through the stories of scripture. In the poem we just shared, we hard about the ways that the light shines in the darkness of creation and the depths of our despair, and the light has always continued to shine. And now it is time for us to reflect on our own stories to wonder: when were the times when God's light shone in our lives? When have we felt God's presence with us—either as a light in the darkness, or in the hand of a child, or the good news of a stranger or an angel or dream?

So, that is our reflection question this morning as we celebrate the birth of Jesus, whom we also call "Emanuel", meaning "God With Us". If it feels right for you, take some time right now to pause this video and reflect on this question: when has there been a time in your life that you felt God's presence was with you? You might want to journal your answer, or if you're worshiping with another person, have a conversation and share your stories. Or maybe you'll

hold onto this question and ponder it through the day on a walk, or some quiet time after worship.

As you reflect on your *own* stories this day, may your heart be opened to the ways that Jesus, Emanuel, God With Us, has also been *God With You*. Thanks be to God! Amen.
